Mission: Chattanooga

Paul Brand was born in southwestern India to missionary parents. He was an orthopedic doctor (and author) who chose his patients among the untouchables. Along with his wife, who was also a physician, he spent a lifetime working with the marred and useless limbs of leprosy victims, transforming the way in which medicine approaches the painful and often exiled world of the leper. Whereas the disfigurements of leprosy were once treated as irreversible consequences of the disease, Dr. Brand brought new hope to sufferers of leprosy by utilizing the body's capacity to heal. "I have come to realize " he once noted, "that every patient of mine, every new born baby, in every cell of its body, has a basic knowledge of how to survive and how to heal that I shall never know. That knowledge," continued Brand, "is the gift of God, who has made our bodies more perfectly than we could ever have devised."

CPC supported missionaries Drs. Sujai and Layanya Suneetha, with Nireekshana ministry in Hyderabad, India, were mentored by Dr. Brand late in his career. They tell of the great impact he had on them personally and professionally. Author Philip Yancey was another greatly influenced by Brand.

Yancey tells of his experience as a young journalist interviewing this dignified Christian statesman and surgeon. He recalls Brand speaking of his patients with tears as he described their experience with the disease, the experimental surgeries and their long-standing suffering. And in the midst of many memorable conversations Yancey recalls the healing presence this physician was to his crippled and weary belief in God. To Yancey, Brand represented faith and hope in action, in reality and in efficacy. As

Dr. Brand restored the image of God in lives maimed by disease, so he also formatively planted the image of God in the once doubt-ridden world of a young author. Writes Yancey, "You need meet only one saint to believe, to silence the noisy arguments of the world."

How often God uses a faithful believer to rouse a distracted world. It is the old man with Scripture permeating his words and thoughts and actions that gives us one more reason to inspect stumbling blocks of doubt. It is the godly woman, while selflessly attending to others and singing theology-rich hymns that makes us wonder again at the person of Christ. One of the most effective apologetics is a life lived for Jesus. One of the most telling defenses of the Christian worldview is a life transformed and sustained by the presence of God. Such lives are certain reminders that God is real and worthy to be followed. "His salvation is near to those who fear Him," proclaims the psalmist, "that His glory may dwell in our land" (85:9).

Oh, that our committed lives might silence the arguments of a noisy world. Oh, that our joyful service to our King and His subjects might be the better defense of our faith. Oh, that captured hearts might, in word and deed, declare and display the excellencies of His grace.
