From the Pen of the Senior Pastor...

With the sun unhindered by clouds and the temperature having cooled, I was treated this morning to a spectacular view of Carter Hall sitting atop Lookout Mountain, its red roof and cream colored walls clearly distinguishable. (I know the color of Carter Hall's roof and walls because I called and asked Linda.)

Of course, some mornings you can't even see the mountain. Other mornings, even if the mountain is visible, Carter Hall is but a shadowy outline.

In Mark 8.22-26 Jesus places His hands upon a blind man twice in order to heal him. After Jesus' first touch, the blind man can see, but everything remains blurry and undefined. It is only after Jesus touches the blind man's eyes a second time that we're told "his sight was restored, and he saw everything clearly."

Peter knew what it was to see and yet not be able to distinguish truth from error. As we talked about this past Sunday, on Easter morning Peter enters the tomb, sees it is empty, but does not understand or believe.

Some time that day, according to Luke, Jesus appears to Peter. Yet, in Luke 24.26ff when Jesus appears to the eleven, they are all — including Peter — described as being startled and frightened, thinking they see a spirit.

The Son has risen, for a moment the heat of opposition has cooled, but it will take time for them to see clearly that Jesus is bodily, physically, risen from the dead, and that therefore the One standing before them is not a ghost but, in fact, flesh and blood.

Even at the end of Matthew's Gospel, as Jesus appears to them in Galilee,

we're told in Matthew 28.17 that while they worshiped Him, some still doubted.

Do any of us have any problems understanding the disciples' inability to see clearly, even after repeated meetings with the risen Lord?

If you do have problems understanding the disciples' struggles, then you are either terribly insensitive to the human predicament, or your faith far exceeds my own

How many times has the Lord "touched" our lives, and yet our vision remains cloudy? Doesn't Paul tell us in 1 Corinthians 13.12 that our present understanding is like looking into a dimly lit mirror and finding that we can barely make out our own reflection.

Paul also tells us in 1 Corinthians 13.12 that there is coming a day when we shall see face to face. On that day, we will no longer only partially understand God's purposes, but instead, we shall know fully.

Can you imagine? Can you? I have my ideas. I'm sure you have yours. But Paul reminds us, at the end of Ephesians 3, that God is "able to do far more abundantly than all that we ask or think."

Someday, the Son will descend, the heat of sin will be cooled, and tears will no longer cloud our eyes. On that day we will see clearly. And listen to this: John promises (1 John 3.2) that "when He appears we shall be like Him, because we shall see Him as He is."

I really enjoyed the view this morning. But what I long for is the day when I shall see face to face, and shall know as I am known.
